PURPOSE

The Association stands for the conservation and improvement of the family as the basic social unit. It deals with sex-social problems which constitute, in the main, the general field of social hygiene. The Association seeks to encourage all means which tend to build up healthy, happy, and socially-wholesome life. It is a membership, non-profit, national organization, dependent entirely on voluntary subscriptions for funds.

WHO ARE ELIGIBLE?

Any man or woman believing that the principles of social hygiene should be advanced in every way consistent both with established procedure and with new methods which give assurance of promoting sound social health, is eligible to apply for membership.

PROFIT AND HELP

The best interests of individual and family health and happiness depend on a clear understanding of the simple principles of this work.
